

Named Storm could be coming our way - Let's be prepared


PLEASE NOTE: The National Hurricane Center is tracking a named storm, Teddy. A Tropical Storm Watch is in effect for portions of Nova Scotia, and heavy rainfall across Atlantic Canada is expected with Teddy between Tuesday and Thursday. The NHC also states that large swells produced by Teddy are expected to affect our coast.

What does this mean? Nova Scotia's Emergency Management Office recommends you move any type of watercraft to high ground.

Shining Waters Marina has been hauling boats steadily for the past 4 days and our haul out schedule for today is full. Should your boat be on a trailer, you still have the option to put it on the hard.

If your vessel cannot be moved out of the water.

- 1. Reduce windage of vessels: Remove canvas, remove sails, remove dinghies, stow lines, fenders and all other loose gear below decks.
- 2. It is critical all mooring or anchor lines are well protected with chafe gear.
- 3. Remove anchors from the anchor roller pulpit
- 4. Leave as much space around vessel as possible (away from other
